Ebonize a Turning

I was playing around with doing some way to blacken the inside of a turning and decided to see if I could obtain a black or nearly black interior without using paint or shoe polish.

Some time ago I read in a book of a method to ebonize wood. It follows:

1. Pour some vinegar into a plastic or glass jar of sufficient size to cover the piece of wood you plan to darken.
2. Place some 4-0 steel wool into the vinegar and let it sit for an hour or two.
3. Apply the mixture to the workpiece. Within a few minutes the wood became black as the mixture soaked into the wood.

I suggest the use of a brush or rag with latex or rubber gloves to apply the mixture. This mixture will also darken your fingers.

If you get the mixture on your hands, it can be neutralized with lemon juice.

TAKING THE WOBBLE OUT OF GRINDING WHEELS

If you have grinding wheels that tend to wobble or flutter left to right while spinning on the shaft, here is a trick to try.

1. Unplug the grinder.
2. Remove the grinder wheel cover.
3. Loosen the nut securing the wheel just a bit, just so the clamping pressure is relieved from the wheel.
4. While holding the wheel and inner flange washer in place, turn the outer flange washer no more than ¼ turn – either way.
5. Re-tighten the nut.
6. Plug in and turn on the grinder and check the side-to-side wobble of the wheel. If the wobble is less or more, repeat the above procedure until you have the least wobble possible.
7. Now, do the same thing with the inner flange washer on the inside of the wheel.
8. Once you have found that “sweet spot” of the wheel; the spot where the wheel and washers fit in a manner to limit, if not almost eliminate, side-to-side wobble of the wheel, retighten the nut and replace your wheel cover.
9. It will probably be necessary to re-true the grinding face of the wheel because you have slightly changed the wheel orientation on the motor shaft.
